Reasons why different actors (professional groups, unions, ONG) fight against this proposal in Germany

- It limits constitutional rights concerning the self-government of municipalities (Art-28/2 Constitution)
- It contradicts the Lisbon Treaty which guarantees to Member States their national identity and local self management structures (Art 4/2)
- It contradicts the principle of subsidiarity belonging to the EU values concerning general interest services (Protocol on general interest services / Art 1)

The proposal threats the democratic legitimacy. It is dangerous for democracy.



Transactions in-house

- The proposal includes the so called in-house transactions where public administration grants a concession to a body controlled by itself
- The proposal affirms: *«However, the application of concession award rules should not interfere with the freedom of public authorities to decide how to organize the way they carry out their public service tasks »*
- The European Court of Justice has issued a judgment allowing public companies the free choice of their bidder (ECJ C-206/08 10.09.2009)
- The proposal as it is currently formulated hinder public authorities autonomy

The commission is reducing little by little the right of public authorities in choosing their partners (In-house).



Privatisation

- Worries that Suez and Veolia buy back the water companies in Germany thanks to dumping, that they dismantle the structures guaranteeing a very good quality water, that they neglect the protection of the resource and of the environment in general
- Water is a matter of trust and it is the heart of public services (DCE 2000/60 22.12.2000). It must not be privatized in any case

Fear of the private companies (Suez, Veolia...) and of a risky water management. Fear that water become just a commodity.



Bureaucracy

- The proposal asks for a relevant administrative effort in terms of personnel and competence: difficult European forms, need of support by very expensive specialized firms not affordable for small municipalities
- Refused companies can appeal: long procedures in the sensitive domain of water

Inflation of bureaucracy, growth of expenses, legal disputes.
